Think Ahead Graduate Programme

Mental ill-health is a growing problem in the UK, with at least one in four people now experiencing mental health problems at some point in their lives. Think Ahead is a **two-year fast-track graduate scheme** to train as a mental health social worker, culminating in a fully-funded Masters in social work from the University of York. Participants on the programme will be paid throughout the two years and work within expert teams alongside clinical professionals.

Music

After a long summer break, **Cambridge University Lunchtime Concerts** are back! Taking place every **Tuesday at 1.10pm** in West Road Concert Hall, these free concerts are the perfect study break and showcase some of Cambridge's best student performers. Volunteer for a study

This is a **2-session fMRI study** that concerns the brain mechanisms underlying attention. In one session, you will perform an attention task with action (~2.5 hrs). In another session, you will perform a similar attention task with words (~3-3.5 hrs). In both sessions, you will go through some behavioural training to get familiar with the task, perform the task in the MRI scanner while we record your brain activity, and then fill out some questionnaires after the task. You will be compensated for your time (**£10/hour**) and your travel (£2.50 or £3).

To be eligible for the study, you need to fulfil the following criteria: Native English Speaker aged 18-45; Right-handed; Normal/Normal-corrected Vision; Normal Colour Perception; Normal hearing; No history or current mental health problems (e.g. Depression, Learning/

Attentional/Language deficits); No history or current neurological conditions; No physical disability (for the action task); *MRI compatible* (please enquire)

Where's East in the North-South Divide

This event will take place at POLIS, University of Cambridge on **Sunday 6 November from 11.30 to 15.00**. In more detail the event will examine Eastern England/East Anglia's place in the context of devolution and local government reform across England, which often focuses on the North-

South divide, and provide an opportunity for a dialogue between businesses, decision makers and the public.

The morning panel of academics will explore English devolution outside of Eastern England/East Anglia and across time followed by a Q&A, in order to allow lessons learnt to be disseminated within the local area. This will be followed by an afternoon panel with local decision makers in discussion with the public about democracy within Eastern England/East Anglia, the 'East Anglia Devolution Agreement' (2016), and how the public can take greater ownership of democracy through devolution or alternatives.

The event is **free** and a **buffet lunch** will be provided for attendees.
